Arthritis in dogs



What is arthritis?

Arthritis, or osteoarthritis, is a very common disease affecting 1 in 5 adult dogs. It is more common in older medium-to-large breed dogs but dogs of any age, size and breed can be affected by this painful degenerative disease.



How does arthritis work in a dog?

Arthritis in a dog is caused when the cartilage within the joints becomes worn away and the synovial fluid which lubricates the joints becomes thin and inflamed which creates friction and pain when your dog moves. The joints may also become swollen which adds to the discomfort.

Some more detail...

All of the joints in the body depend on a layer of cartilage which acts as a shock-absorber inside the joint and also provides a smooth surface so the adjoining bones can move freely over each other. This is also assisted by the lubrication provided by synovial fluid in the joints.

In arthritis, the smooth cartilage covering of the bones inside the joints deteriorates and wears thin, sometimes allowing the bones themselves to rub together. The synovial fluid becomes thin and watery, losing some of its lubricating properties. These changes together create friction and pain inside the joint.

All these issues are caused by the cumulative effects of abnormal stresses placed on the joints. Arthritis can occur with abnormal alignment of bones that make up the joint, with trauma, aging and continual wear/tear on the joint structures.

Arthritis can affect one or more joints and any joint can be affected, but the most common joints that are affected in dogs are the hips, knees, shoulders and elbows.

What causes arthritis in dogs?

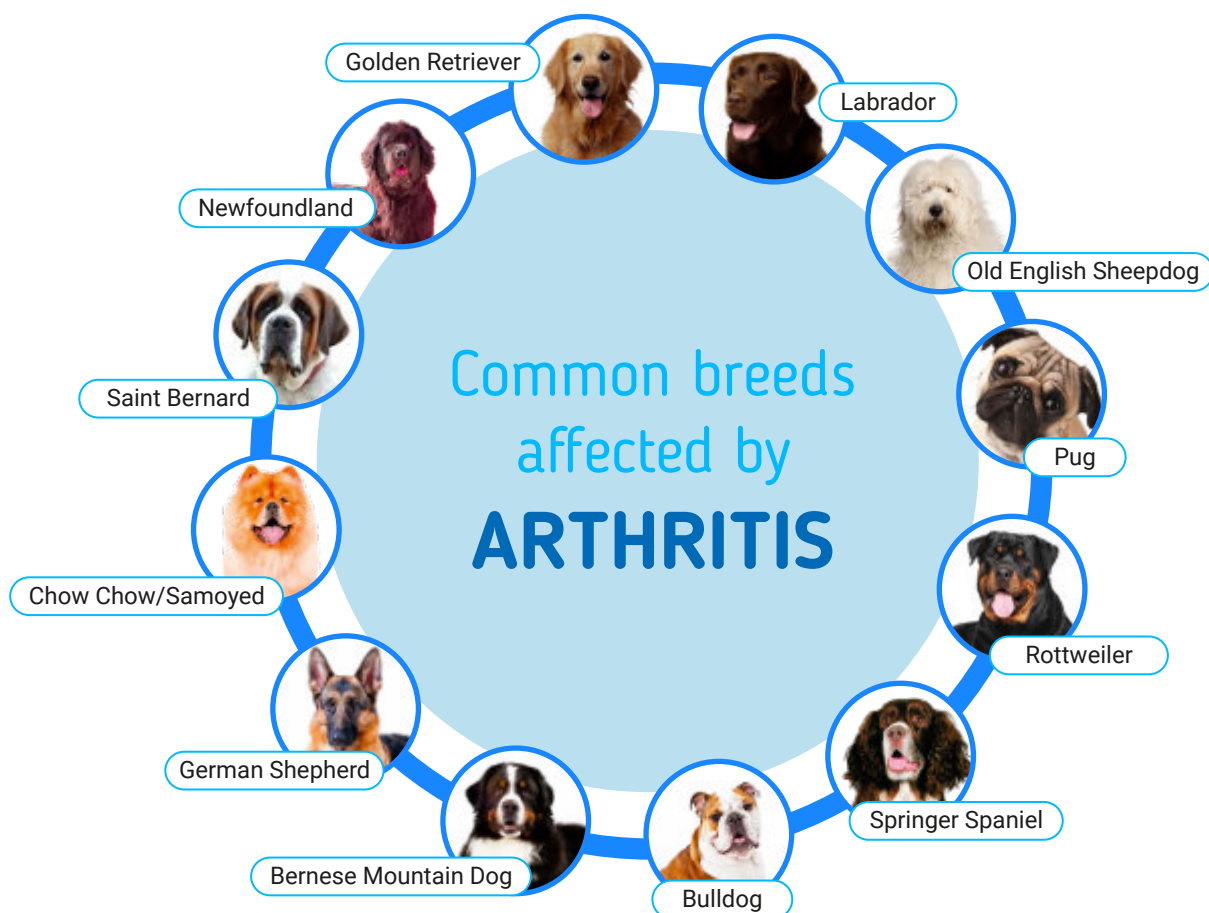
The cause can be hereditary or breed related (as in hip and elbow dysplasia) or related to injury or wear and tear.

Dogs that are overweight will often get arthritis at an earlier age and more severely, as the joints are carrying a greater load than that they are designed for. In addition, fat has what is called a pro-inflammatory effect, increasing inflammation inside the joints.

Arthritis at its worst and especially if left untreated, can cause chronic pain, difficulty moving and a decline in your dog's quality of life. As the disease develops slowly, it is often assumed that it's just old age and that nothing can be done. Fortunately, this is not true and [there are a variety of treatments available](#).

How can stem cell therapy help a dog with arthritis?

Stem Cell therapy helps to repair damaged tissue inside the joints thus restoring cartilage function and reducing pain.

The signs weren't obvious.

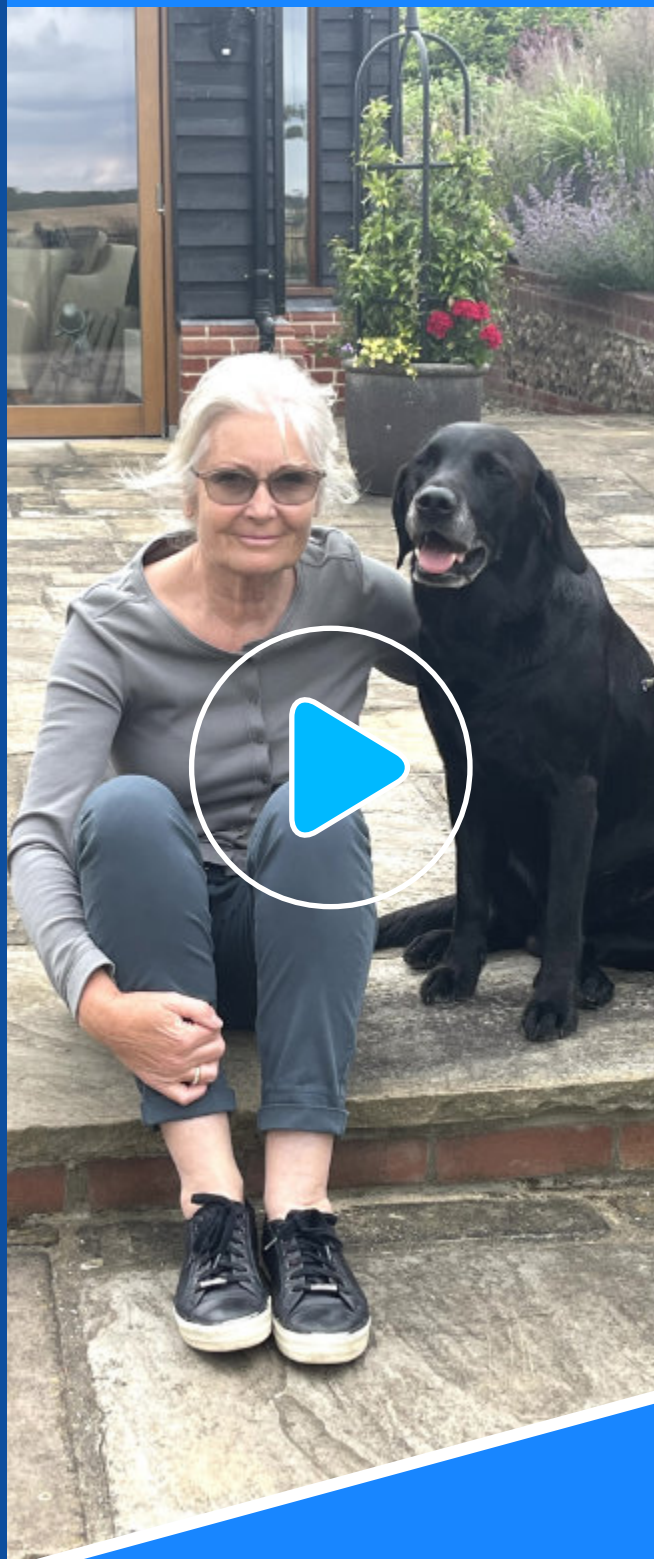
Jane had noticed that at times Splash didn't want to get out of his bed. He had also become reluctant to exercise as much.

Is your dog suffering from arthritis?

Have you noticed any of the following?

- Reduced activity
- Reluctance to walk or play
- Stiffness in the legs (especially after rest)
- Difficulty getting up
- Limping/lameness
- Difficulty climbing stairs/steps or jumping into the car
- Lagging on walks
- Licking or chewing at joints
- Yelping in pain when touched
- Personality changes e.g. not being his or her self, or aggression
- Reduced appetite

Don't assume it's just old age and that nothing can be done. Your pet may be in pain and something can be done. If your dog is showing any of the above signs or symptoms, then it's time for a check-up.

Winter is the time of year when our dogs may suffer the most from arthritis, but the pain can last all year long. As osteoarthritis progresses the pain becomes much worse, so the sooner the problem is recognised the sooner your dog can be helped.

Hip Dysplasia

What is Hip Dysplasia?

Hip Dysplasia is a genetic condition in which there is a tendency towards development of hip problems, sometimes early in life. The soft tissues that normally stabilise the hip joint can become loose within the first few weeks of life which makes the ball and socket of the hip joint unstable and deformed. Dogs with hip dysplasia almost always go on to develop arthritis of the hips.

What is the cause of Hip Dysplasia?

Hip dysplasia is of genetic cause. Environmental factors are unable to cause hip dysplasia. There is no evidence to support the concept that excessive exercise as a puppy or running up and down stairs can contribute to the development of hip dysplasia.

What happens inside the hip joint?

Pain is caused by micro-fracturing of the bone and cartilage surfaces that are rubbing against one another. As cartilage erodes, osteoarthritis and pain develop.

Treatment options for dogs with Hip Dysplasia

Common treatment options for dogs suffering from hip dysplasia range from changes in lifestyle and diet, to painkillers and surgery.

Various types of surgery can be performed if the disease is caught early and before there is too much joint damage, otherwise a complete hip replacement may be necessary.

There are three major surgeries for hip dysplasia:

Femoral Head and Neck Osteotomy (FHO):

This surgical treatment for hip dysplasia entails removing the femoral head (ball) of the hip joint, allowing the body to create a “false” joint. FHO can help to decrease the discomfort related to hip dysplasia, as the bones can no longer rub against each other although normal hip function is unlikely to be restored.

Double or triple pelvic osteotomy (DPO/

TPO): Typically performed on dogs younger than 10 months old, this surgery involves cutting the pelvic bone in specific locations and rotating the individual segments, resulting in an improvement in the anatomy of the ball and socket joint.

Total Hip Replacement (THR): During THR surgery the dog’s entire hip joint is removed and replaced with a synthetic ball and socket. This surgery is considered end stage and can have a long recovery period.

How Stem Cell Therapy can help

Stem cell can help to regenerate cartilage in the hip joints. Your dog can be treated with stem cell injections into the arthritic joints, restoring cartilage and function and reducing pain.

Stem cells contribute to regenerate and repair damaged tissue, as well as making new blood vessels inside the joint, and are highly anti-inflammatory. All of these effects help to reduce pain and enable your dog to become much more mobile.

Younger dogs with hip dysplasia can also benefit. Use of stem cells in dysplastic hip joints from an early age can limit arthritic changes to a minimum and can represent a less invasive alternative to total hip replacement surgery.



Elbow Dysplasia

What is Elbow Dysplasia?

Elbow dysplasia is a collective term for a range of conditions describing abnormal development of the elbow joint. These are inherited conditions that tend to affect medium and large breed dogs. The conditions are:

- Coronoid disease (usually a fracture of the medial coronoid process of the ulna due to abnormal forces loading on that process)
- Ununited anconeal process of the ulna
- Osteochondrosis dissecans of the humerus
- Joint incongruity due to different growth rates of the radius and ulna

The most common of these conditions is coronoid disease. Coronoid disease and joint incongruity are sometimes found together. Coronoid disease is also known as medial compartment disease and fragmentation of the medial coronoid process.

All forms of elbow dysplasia lead to osteoarthritis as the dog ages.



Treatment options for dogs with Elbow Dysplasia

Traditionally the “treatment” of coronoid disease has been to remove the medial coronoid process using arthroscopy, whilst inserting a camera into the joint. Sometimes this is combined with surgery to re-align the ulna so that it becomes congruent with the radius.

Osteoarthritis occurs whether the dog has surgery or not, and this osteoarthritis is often severe and crippling for the patient.

Some vets may believe that surgery leads to a good outcome for dogs with ununited anconeal process and osteochondrosis dissecans. Stem cell therapy can be used following these surgical procedures in an attempt to limit arthritic changes and can also be used in place of these surgeries in select cases.

How stem cell therapy can help

It has been suggested that stem cell therapy might be a better alternative than surgery for dogs that have elbow dysplasia. This is because stem cell therapy is used to change the destructive environment within an arthritic joint to a regenerative and healthy environment within that joint.

Furthermore, it has been suggested that elbow dysplasia patients who receive stem cell treatment at an early age, may suffer less from arthritis than those who have surgery or are not treated at all.

Partial Cruciate Ligament Rupture

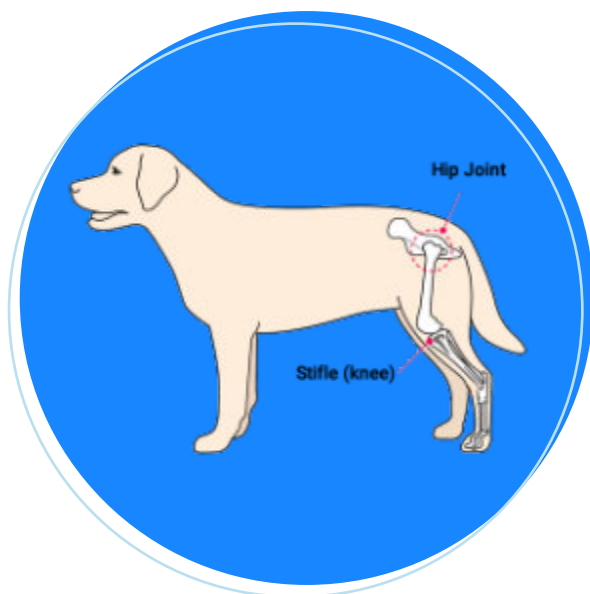

Let's begin with a quick lesson on canine anatomy.

In four-legged animals the equivalent of the human knee joint is called the stifle joint.

The stifle joint of a dog is a complex joint where the femur (the thigh bone) meets the tibia (the shin bone).



The stifle joint is held together by four ligaments. There are ligaments on either side of the joint (called the medial and lateral collateral ligaments). There are two ligaments within the joint that form a cross shape between the bottom of the femur and the top of the tibia, and these are the cruciate ligaments.

One of the cruciate ligaments is called the cranial cruciate ligament, because it lies in front of the other. The other is called the caudal cruciate ligament.

It is rare to see damage to the caudal cruciate ligament in dogs but it is common to see damage to the cranial cruciate ligament.

Cruciate disease is the gradual deterioration and weakening of the cranial cruciate ligament. It has a hereditary cause in that some dogs are prone to it, but occasionally it can be caused (as in the classic footballers injury in humans) by trauma - sudden twisting or turning for example.

Eventually the ligament can become so weak that it tears, leading to an unstable stifle joint that requires surgery.



Cruciate disease is more common in large dogs, older dogs, dogs that are obese or unfit and those dogs that have a particularly steep slope to the top of the tibia.

Not all dogs with cruciate disease go on to tear the cruciate ligament but many do.

Whether the cranial cruciate ligament tears completely or not, **it is inevitable that a joint with cruciate disease will develop arthritis.**



How stem cell therapy can help

Ligaments heal slowly. The weakening of the cranial cruciate ligament in dogs with cruciate disease happens when the rate of damage to the ligament is faster than the rate at which the body can repair the ligament.

Regenerative medicine can increase the potential for the body to repair the cranial cruciate ligament.

It is thought that regenerative medicine also helps to reduce the progression of arthritis within the joint.

Treatment with regenerative medicine is likely to be most effective when given early in the course of cruciate disease. It is not effective when the cranial cruciate ligament has torn or is close to tearing.

However where there is a partial cruciate ligament tear, stem cell therapy can be used as a treatment option.

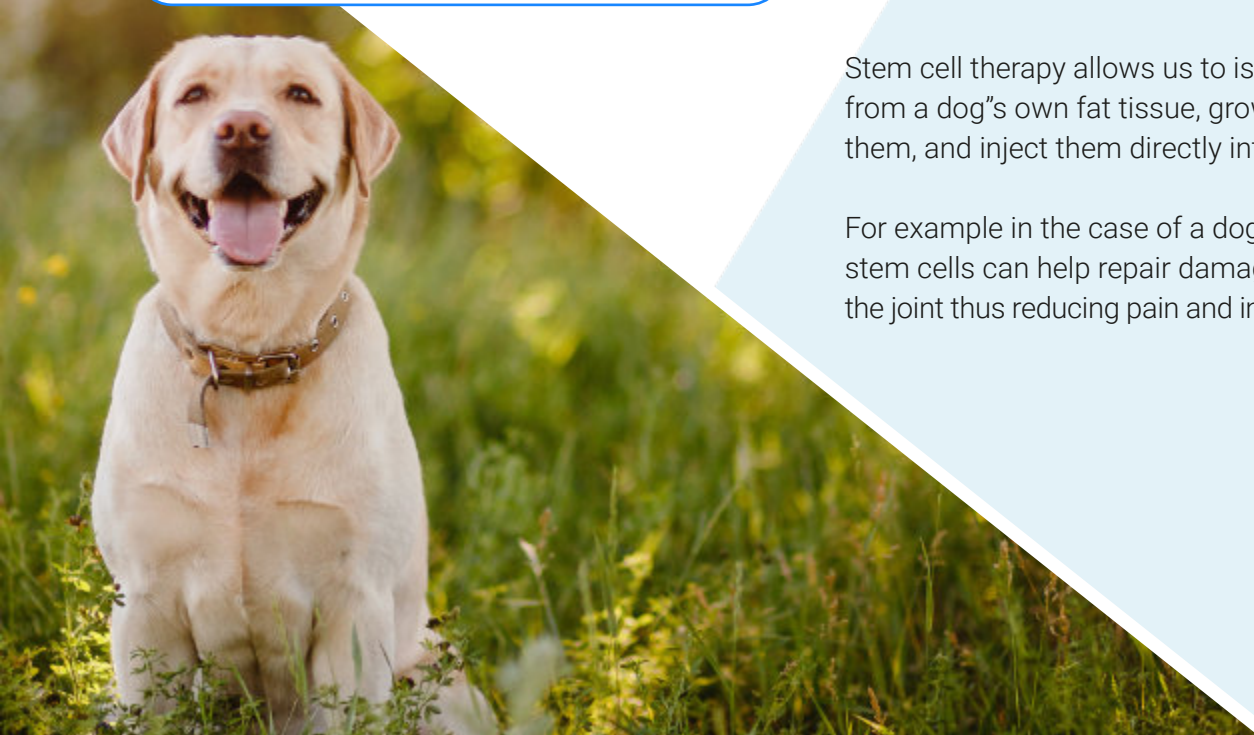
What are stem cells?

Stem cells are powerful healing cells in the body that can transform into other types of cells. They are the building blocks of the body tissues.

Stem cells are actually cells that haven't yet changed into a particular type of cell. These stem cells are known as undifferentiated cells for this reason. Once they become a particular type of cell (for example bone or cartilage), they are known as differentiated cells.

Stem cell therapy allows us to isolate stem cells from a dog's own fat tissue, grow and activate them, and inject them directly into damaged areas.

For example in the case of a dog who has arthritis, stem cells can help repair damaged tissue inside the joint thus reducing pain and increasing mobility.



Stem cell therapy is a very useful addition to conventional treatments for arthritis and other conditions that may not be effective enough in limiting pain, improving mobility or increasing quality of life.

Stem cells work to orchestrate the healing process. We like to say they act as the 'conductor' of the body's own healing response. Stem cells do this by acting in the following ways;

- Generate new tissue
- Supply growth factors
- Help with blood vessel creation
- Attract progenitor cells (other stem cells already circulating in the body)
- Make extracellular matrix which supports the joint
- Prevent cell death
- Are anti-inflammatory
- Regenerate and replace injured or diseased tissue via cell differentiation
- Modulate signaling pathways to reduce progression of disease
- Act as a magnet for stem cells circulating in the body (known as the 'paracrine effect')

- Are anti-fibrotic (prevent fibrous deposits in the joints)

In short, stem cell therapy can improve your dog's quality of life because it can help provide long lasting pain reduction, facilitate better mobility and give your dog a new lease of life.

What does the evidence say?

There is a growing body of evidence supporting the use of stem cells in both animal and human use. Stem Cell Vet has curated and collated articles and peer reviewed scientific studies on regenerative medicine and its use in the treatment of animals and humans. View this directory [here](#).

Munchkin

CASE STUDY

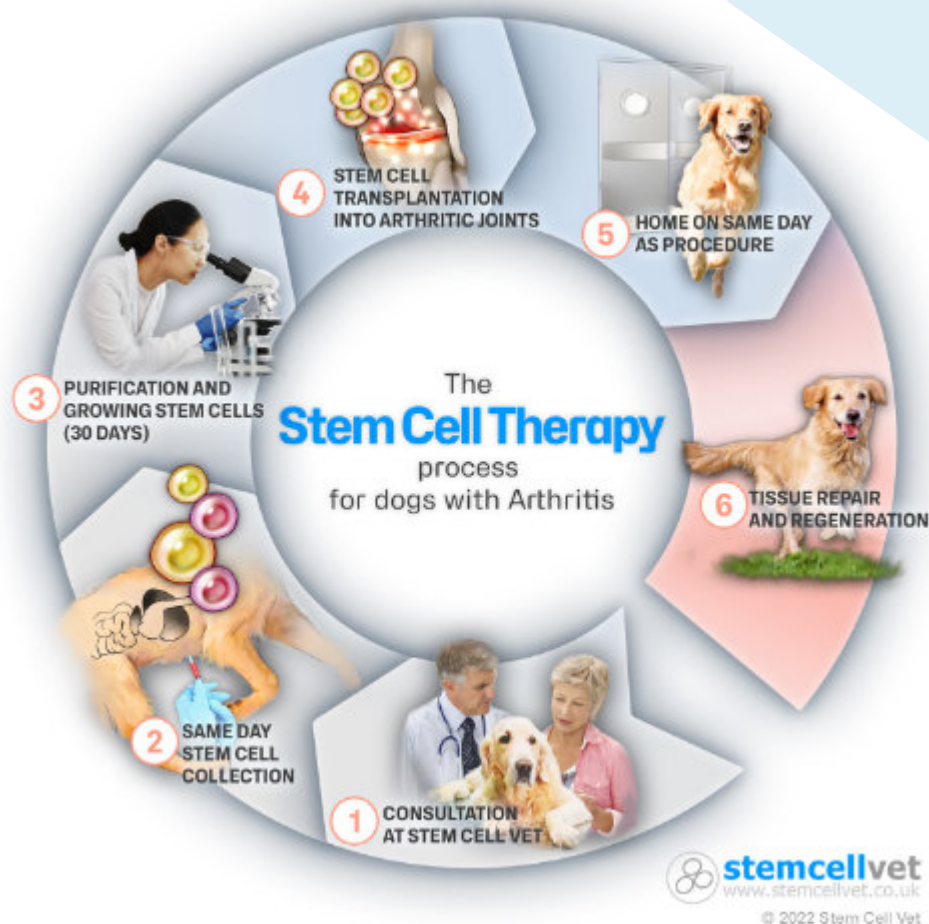


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The stem cell therapy process for a dog with arthritis



Here's an overview of the stem cell therapy process at Stem Cell Vet

The treatment is a simple, minimally invasive 2-stage process.

The procedure is carried out as an outpatient - patients do not need an overnight stay with us. We usually require two visits in total, four to six weeks apart.

Stage

1

Stem Cell Retrieval

We start by taking some blood tests for anaesthetic safety. Once we are happy with these, we administer a short general anaesthetic. Typically this lasts 30 to 60 minutes.

We then harvest 10 grams of fat from a site just inside the tummy. (Watch Dr Halperin explain this process [here](#).)

After the fat harvest for stem cell retrieval, your dog is woken from the anaesthetic. Any stitches we use are dissolvable and do not need to be removed.

If your dog is having complementary regenerative treatments such as PRP or joint fluid replacement injections, these treatments are usually administered at the same time as this fat harvest.

Stage

2

Stem Cell Implantation

The fat we have retrieved from your dog's tummy is treated in our lab to isolate, concentrate, grow and activate the stem cells, in the millions. This typically takes 4-6 weeks.

Once we have grown healthy stem cells, we organise a second appointment for you. During this appointment, a short anaesthetic is given and we inject the stem cells directly into the affected joints.

Stem cells start to work in the body immediately and we expect to see an improvement within 12 weeks though we commonly see improvement in pain reduction and mobility much sooner.

We have a strict follow up policy so we keep in constant detailed communication with you about your dog's progress, mobility and happiness.



Did you know?

At Stem Cell Vet, your dog's stem cells are frozen for future use. We freeze some of the stem cells we harvest in the rare case they are needed for later use.

Your initial in-person consultation

What happens during your first appointment at Stem Cell Vet?

After your dog passes our candidacy check process, the next step is an in-person consultation.

During this appointment we discuss all your concerns and carry out a full clinical examination, including general health examination, neurologic and orthopaedic exams.

We may need to take x-rays of the affected joints. Where recent, good diagnostic quality x-rays are available from your own vet, we will not need to repeat these.

We will assess the current treatment protocol you have in place for your dog and make adjustments or recommendations so that we are happy that you have the benefit of all the most up to date therapies.

In many cases, patients we see are already being treated with a variety of other solutions and yet are still struggling. In these cases stem cell therapy can be of great benefit.

Stem cell therapy is a very useful addition to conventional treatments for arthritis and other conditions that may not be effective enough in limiting pain, improving mobility or enhancing quality of life.

Summary of the treatment process

1. Free phone consultation
2. Candidacy check carried out by our in house clinical team to confirm we can help
3. Stage 1 - visit to Stem Cell Vet clinic
 - In-person consultation and physical exam
 - Blood tests to ensure suitability for therapy and anaesthetic
 - Full radiography service
 - Injection of platelet-rich plasma (PRP) into joint(s) and/or joint fluid replacement injections
 - Adipose (fat) harvest for stem cell retrieval
 - Preparation, counting and culture of stem cells (30 days)
4. Stage 2 - second visit to Stem Cell Vet
 - Injection of stem cells into joint(s)
 - Comprehensive follow-up plan by phone, video or in clinic at 30, 60, 90, 180 and 360 days

Time frame for full treatment (stage 1 to stage 2) = 4 to 6 weeks.

Candidacy check

If you are considering stem cell therapy for your dog, when you speak to us we will request certain information from you so that we can check if your dog is a suitable candidate for treatment.

This candidacy check process is a crucial part of our treatment process and it is one of the reasons we obtain such high success rates for the treatments we offer.

We will only ever give treatment to a dog who we feel will achieve significant improvements in mobility, pain and quality of life.

Please note, you are under no obligation to proceed with treatment even if your dog qualifies.

Information we need from you

In order to perform the candidacy check, we need the following information from you before you proceed to having an in-person appointment:

1. Your dog's records and clinical history (including any scans or X-rays).
2. Videos of your dog. In order to assess your dog for treatment we need to observe him/her. Please video your dog as follows:
 - A) From the left hand side walking
 - B) From the right hand side walking
 - C) From the front walking
 - D) From the back walking
 - E) A free roaming walk, off lead for about 30 seconds

After we receive these videos and clinical notes, our clinical team of veterinarians will review them and propose treatment options.



A member of our Client Care Advisor team will phone you within 24 hours to share this information and the outcome with you.

If your dog is a suitable candidate for treatment, we will provide a quote for treatment and offer you an in-person consultation.



The cost of full treatment including complimentary regenerative therapies, plus stem cell therapy, is between £7950 - £9750.

Most insurance companies will cover these costs. We also have finance packages available.

CASE STUDY

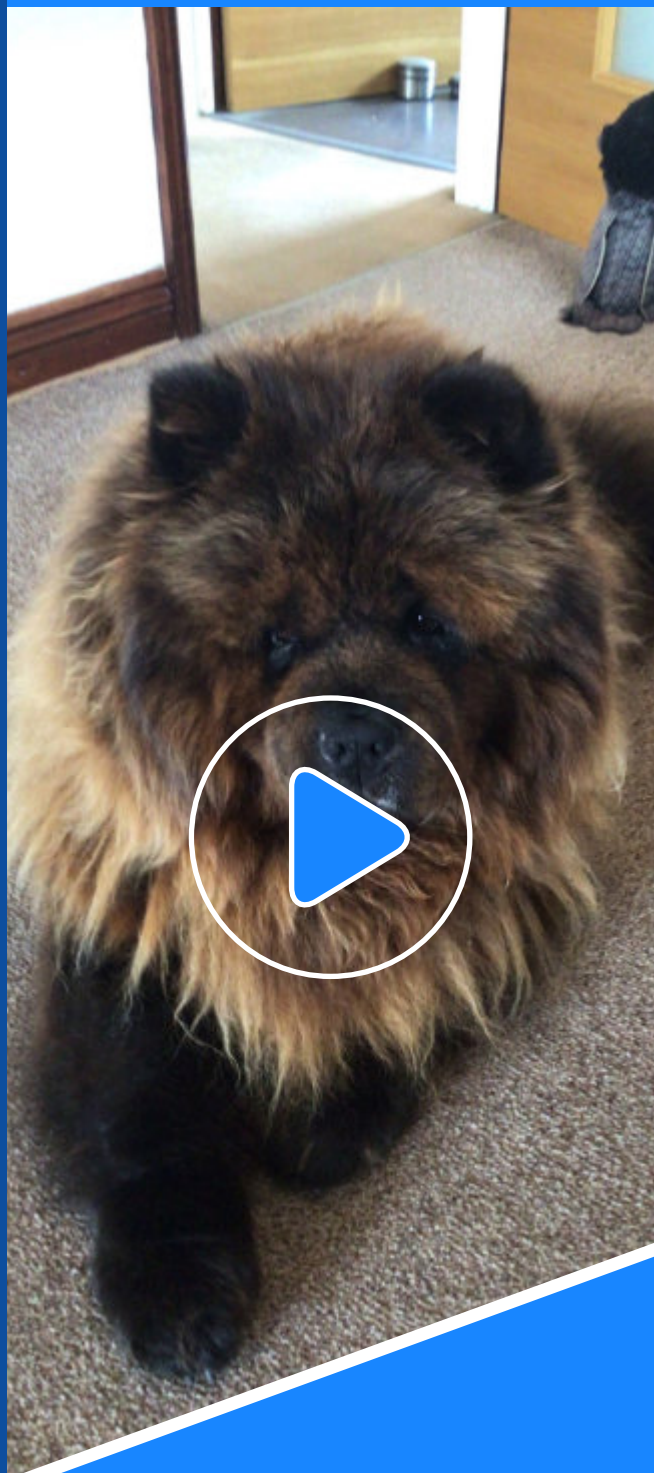

Complimentary regenerative therapies



Optimising the joint for health & mobility

At Stem Cell Vet we take a multi-modal approach with each individual dog in order to achieve the best possible outcome.

Our single goal is to significantly improve the lives of the patients under our care. This means we may offer complementary regenerative therapies, as part of the stem cell therapy **to enhance efficacy of treatment.**

There are two main complementary regenerative therapies that can be helpful to a dog with arthritis. These are:

Platelet Rich Plasma (PRP)

Platelet Rich Plasma therapy falls under the banner of regenerative medicine and utilises the body's ability to self-repair.

PRP injections for dogs can decrease pain associated with arthritis by reducing inflammation in the joints.



At Stem Cell Vet we often will treat a dog with PRP prior to stem cell therapy, in order to put the joint in the best possible condition for repair.

It is a day procedure that involves a blood sample being taken from your dog.

The blood is then run through a centrifuge to concentrate the platelets. These activated platelets are then injected directly into the dog's arthritic joint.

PRP stimulates healing of inflamed tissues and improves pain and function of the joint. The therapy is fast acting and pain is often reduced within a week after treatment.

What is the difference between stem cell therapy and PRP?

PRP provides stimulation to improve the quality and speed of healing in the body, reducing pain and inflammation and improving the environment within the joint. Stem cells help to repair and regenerate damaged tissue.

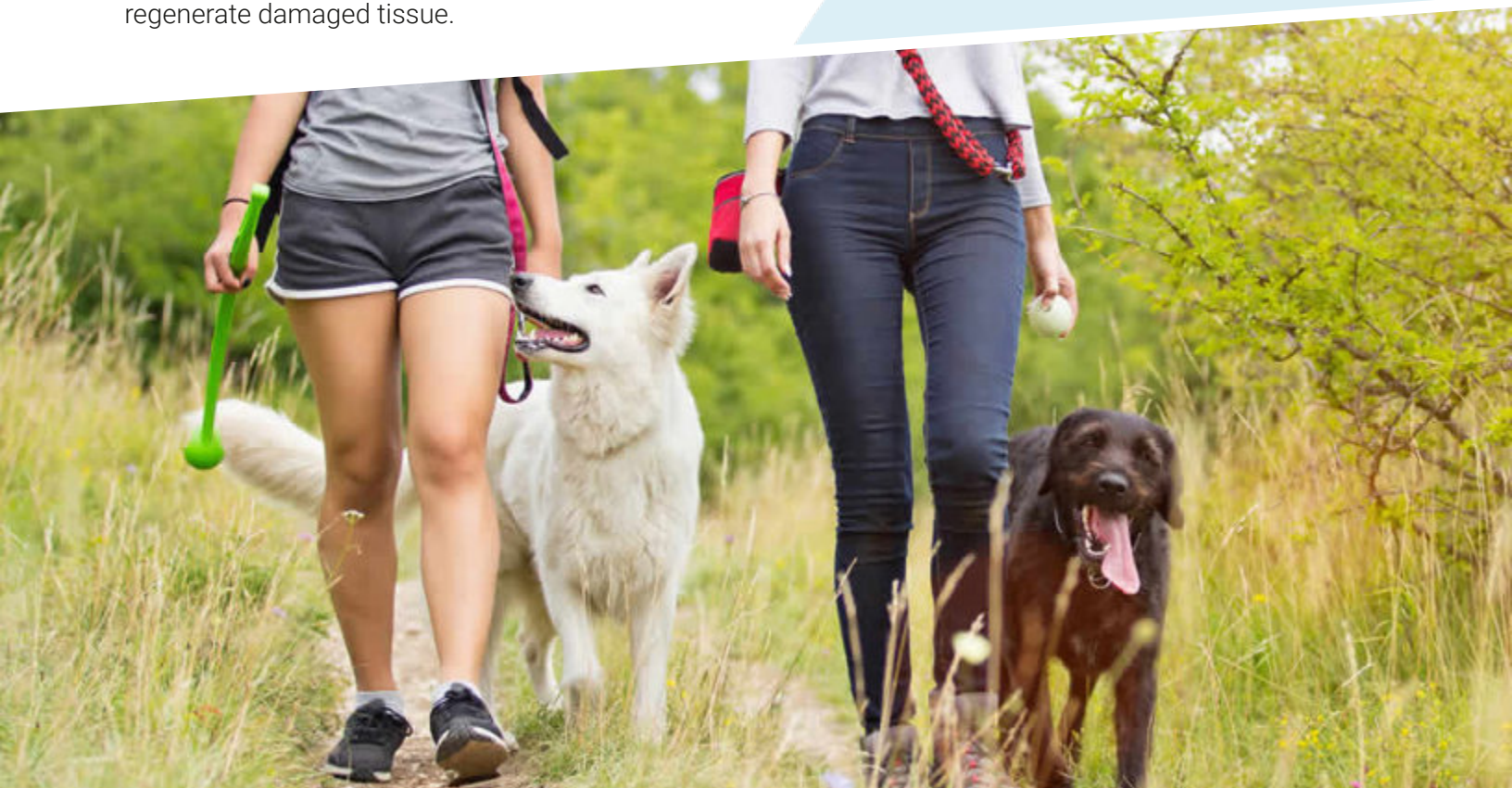
In summary, PRP injections for dogs can decrease pain associated with arthritis by reducing inflammation in the joints and improving the function of the joint.

Joint Fluid Replacement Injections

Synovial fluid (which is the sticky fluid inside a joint) can degrade in an arthritic joint. We can replace that with a synthetic joint tissue fluid which can help to lubricate and cushion the joint, whilst also providing pain relief.

Did you know?

PRP and joint fluid replacement injections are covered by most pet insurance companies.



Frequently asked questions



How quickly does stem cell therapy work?

Stem cells start to work in the body immediately and we expect to see an improvement within 12 weeks, although we commonly see marked improvement within 3 weeks.

How long does stem cell therapy last?

The vast majority of dogs we treat at Stem Cell Vet will only ever need one treatment in their lifetime. If a further treatment is ever needed, we store your dog's own stem cells at our lab which means we have the cells available if they are needed. .

What is the success rate?

To date, Stem Cell Vet has not treated a dog that has not responded extremely well in terms of increased mobility, pain reduction and improved quality of life.

In the United States the published success rates are that 85% of dogs respond very well to stem cell therapy.

At Stem Cell Vet, with our clinical protocols and treatments tailored for each dog individually, our results are much better than this.

Is it safe?

Yes, stem cell therapy is minimally invasive and very safe. Treatments are low risk because we use your own dog's stem cells.

Your dog will be required to undergo a general anaesthetic to collect fat tissue (from which we isolate the stem cells).

Some people often worry that their dog may be too old for anaesthetic, but, anaesthesia can be safe for older dogs. Please see our article on anaesthesia for older dogs [here](#).

At Stem Cell Vet we always carry out a full pre-anaesthetic blood test and use the safest available anaesthetics and monitoring equipment.. To date we have never had an anaesthetic issue at our clinic.

Is stem cell therapy covered by pet insurance?

Yes, stem cell therapy is typically covered by most insurance companies in the UK.

However please do get in contact with your insurance company to find out if this treatment is covered under your specific policy. On our initial call with you, we can help you with this process.

What is the cost of stem cell therapy for dogs?

The cost of regenerative treatments such as stem cell therapy, platelet rich plasma and joint fluid replacement therapy varies for each patient depending on the needs of each dog we see.

For example some dogs may require multiple joints to be treated and others may need a combination of the regenerative treatments we offer. For this reason costs may vary.

At Stem Cell Vet, the cost of full treatment is between £7950 - £9750. This is covered by most pet insurance companies. For those without pet insurance finance packages are available.

At Stem Cell Vet, we have rigorous candidacy checks in place and will only give treatment when we absolutely feel we will get positive results. This means we may not recommend regenerative therapy for all dogs.

Will stem cell therapy treat Spondylosis?

Spondylosis is a radiographic change where bone spurs or bridges are seen on a spinal x-ray or CT scan. They are rarely a source of pain but do indicate micro-instability between the vertebrae of the spine.

Stem cell therapy will not treat spondylosis directly, but because it is not considered to be the source of discomfort we usually find that a good orthopaedic examination reveals the source of pain or poor mobility is coming from other joints such as the hips. Generally treatment of these joints alleviates pain, improves mobility and greatly improves quality of life.

What is the oldest age a dog can have stem cell therapy?

To date the oldest dog we have treated at Stem Cell Vet is 14 and a half years old.

What is the difference between Librela and Stem Cell therapy?

Librela is a monthly injection given to dogs to help with pain. Librela temporarily reduces pain but it doesn't treat the source of the problem, It manages symptoms and requires ongoing administration. Some dogs may experience side effects and Librela can also stop working for some dogs over time.

Stem cell therapy harnesses the body's own ability to self repair. Stem cells treat the source of the problem by generating new healthy tissue to heal the joint from within. This has a long term regenerative effect and the vast majority of dogs will only need one treatment.

Where is Stem Cell Vet located?

What happens if I don't live close to Stem Cell Vet?

Founder of Stem Cell Vet, Dr Stewart Halperin in 2012 became one of the very first vets in the UK to carry out Adipose derived Stem Cell transplants in a dog with arthritis.

Should you invest in stem cell therapy for your dog?

It has been calculated by pet insurance companies that the average pet owner who has a dog with arthritis will spend £7,000 over a 3 year period on solutions to manage their dog's condition. Maybe you can relate?

Most of these solutions require ongoing daily, weekly or monthly administration.

Stem cell therapy on the other hand may only require one treatment. The benefits of pain reduction and improved mobility can often last the dog's lifetime.

Regenerative therapies use the body's own healing properties to treat the source of the problem, not just the symptoms.

This is important to some dog owners who are looking for more than a 'band-aid' solution and may want as natural a treatment as possible.

May reduce future costs

With rising costs due to inflation, it's smart to consider regenerative therapies because they can reduce other costs such as medication that you may be spending on your dog.



Covered by pet insurance

The wonderful thing is that regenerative therapies such as platelet rich plasma, joint fluid replacement and stem cell therapy are covered by most pet insurance companies in the UK.

Cover may vary depending on what plan you are on so it is recommended to contact your pet insurance provider to check what is covered under your plan. Again, we can help you with this process.

Quality of life

Stem cell therapy can reduce pain, increase mobility and give your dog a new lease of life.

Most pet owners feel the opportunity to give their beloved dog the best quality of life possible is priceless.

Cost benefit of choosing stem cell therapy to treat hip dysplasia in dogs

Anti-inflammatories for pain control can cost upwards of £150 per month.

Monthly laser or acupuncture treatments cost approximately £45 a session, with multiple sessions needed each week to begin with, then once a week after that.

These treatments may or may not help reduce the dog's pain and will likely be needed throughout the dog's life.

Depending upon the procedure, surgery can cost anywhere from £5,500 (FHO and TPO surgeries, per hip) all the way up to £10,000 (THR, or total hip replacement.)

On the other hand, treating hip joints with **stem cells** can restore cartilage and lessen painful movement in your dog.



Stem cell therapy for hip joints plus complementary regenerative therapies, will cost between £7950 - £9750 (which is usually covered by pet insurance). In the majority of cases your dog will only ever need one treatment.

If you are in the UK and have a dog with arthritis, whether you have insurance or not, we encourage you to see if your dog is a good candidate for stem cell therapy. You and your dog have nothing to lose and everything to gain.

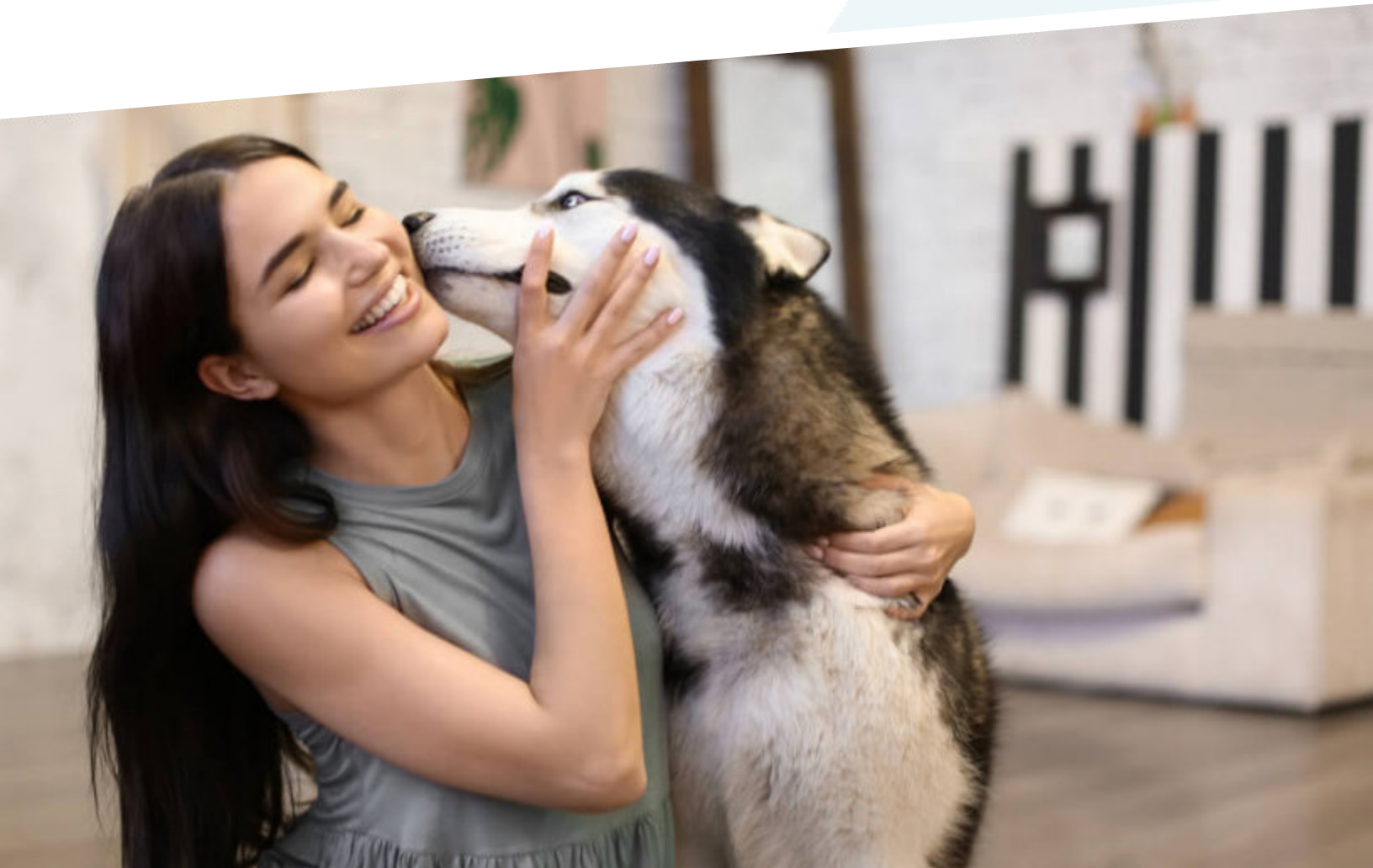

Choosing a clinic for treatment



Deciding where to have treatment for your dog is an important decision. It matters because the stem cell treatment will vary from clinic to clinic.

Common differences

- Some clinics may not have thorough candidacy checks in place and may offer treatment to any dog regardless of anticipated results.
- Length of stem cell harvest time and number of cells grown may differ from clinic to clinic.
- Different clinics may have different levels of experience in performing the treatment.
- Not all clinics may offer complimentary regenerative therapies (such as PRP and joint fluid replacement injections) which enhance treatment efficacy in selected cases.
- Clinics may vary in their level of patient care and follow up process, as well as length of consultation time with your dog.
- Some clinics may use older stem cell treatments. These differ from treatments we use at Stem Cell Vet where we harvest, grow and test each dog's stem cells, as well as carry out sterility checks and full cell counts.

- Results monitoring. At Stem Cell Vet we have a robust monitoring process to ensure we collect clinical metrics for all of our patients so we can objectively measure how they are doing before and after treatment.

All of the above factors can influence the experience you and your dog have, treatment results, and longevity of results.

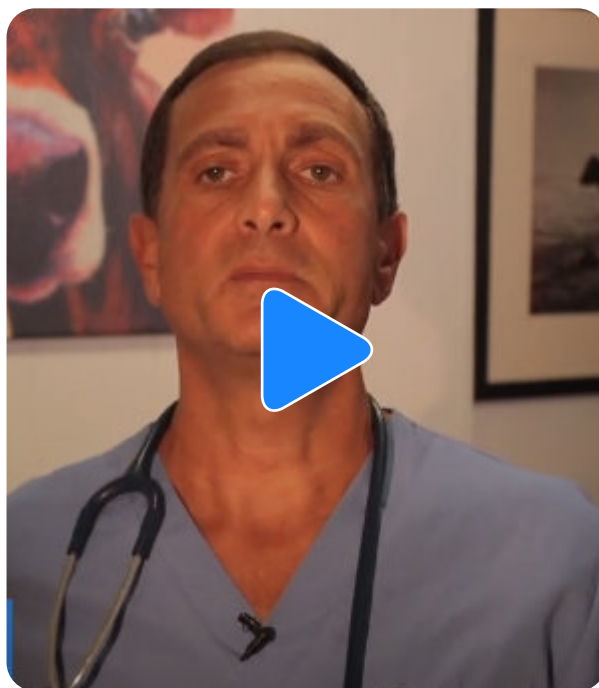

However this isn't the case. We see referrals from local primary vets as well as referral centres and we work in conjunction with your vet who wants to give their patients the very best treatment that's available.

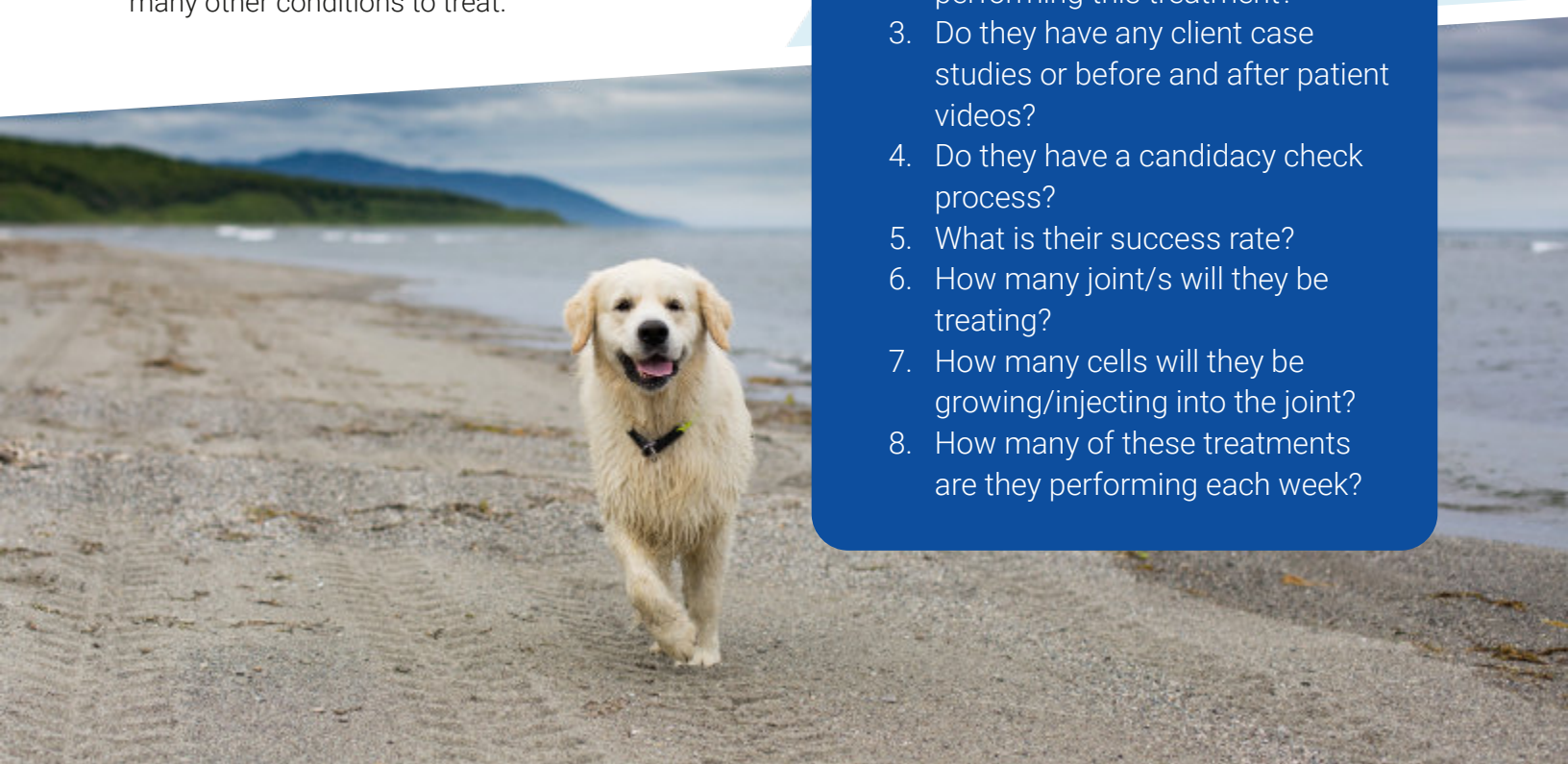
Some vets may not be aware that regenerative treatments for arthritis are available as they have many other conditions to treat.
